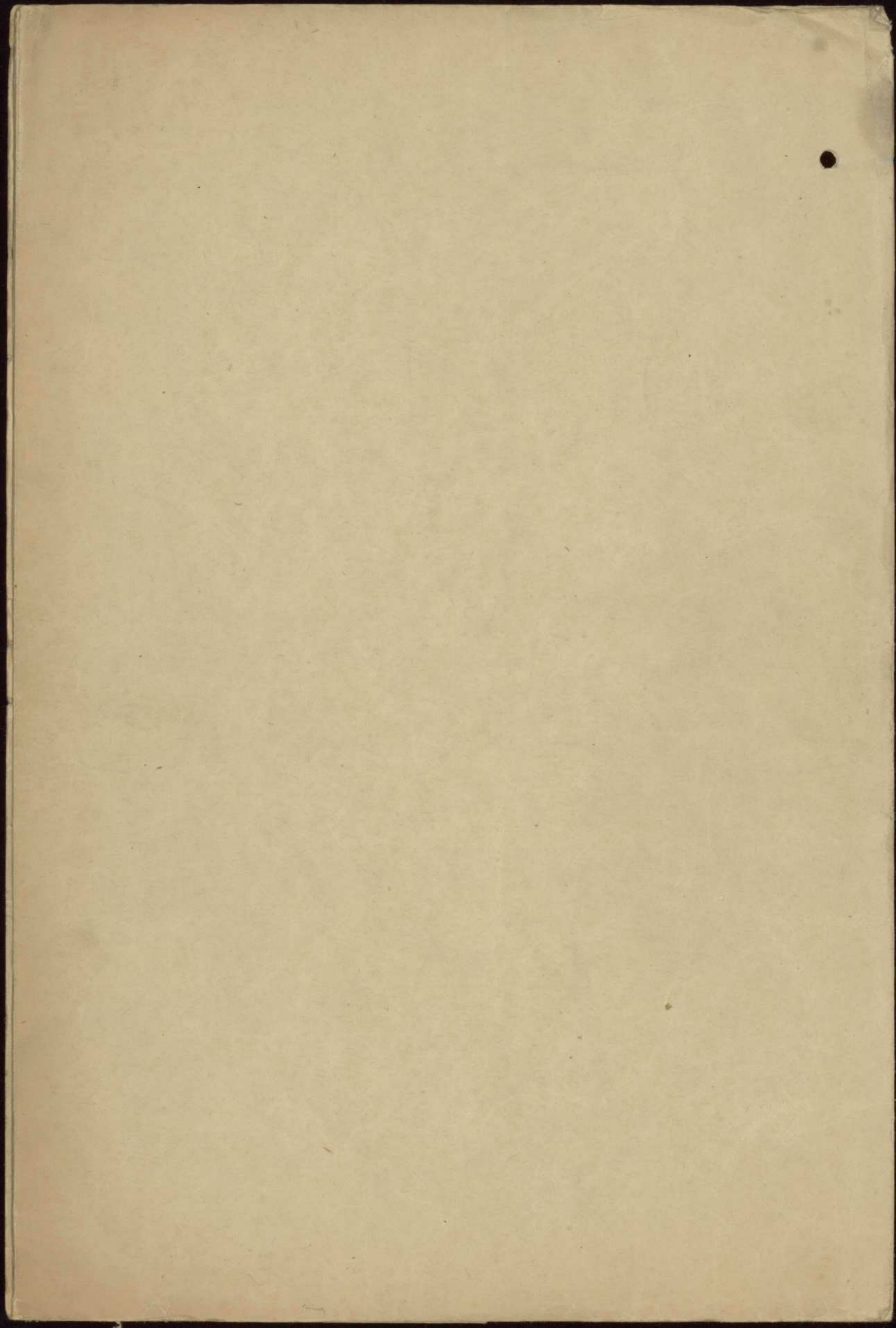

Note on the part played by the International Institute as an agent  
for inter-university relations.

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Since its inauguration towards the end of 1925, the general work of the International Institute of Intellectual Co-operation in the field of university relations has been the collecting and distributing of information and the editing of publications, i.e., the Bulletin of University Relations, the annual Pamphlet on Holiday Courses in Europe, and the recently published handbook entitled "University Exchanges in Europe". The publication of this handbook has been made possible by the generous financial assistance of the American Council on Education, and is the result of a careful enquiry on the part of the I.I.I.C., carried out by means of personal visits to most of the countries of Europe. It gives a brief but fairly complete survey of the opportunities afforded for study and research work in Europe, by means of exchanges, scholarships, fellowships and so forth, open to professors, teachers and students.

Apart from this general work, the Institute has concentrated on the three following special points:-

- (1) Annual meetings between the Directors of National University Offices.
- (2) The co-ordination of Higher International Studies.
- (3) Annual meetings of the representatives of International Students' Organisations.







(1) The Directors of the National University Offices held third meeting, in Paris, in April 1928. The attendance has grown steadily since the first meeting in 1926, and the organisation for intellectual co-operation has been instrumental in forming a number of new Offices, which are already active. The meetings have been welcomed as affording an opportunity for personal contact between the Directors of the various University Offices, for an exchange of views, and for making arrangements for regular exchanges of publications and the spreading of information regarding facilities afforded to visiting teachers, scientists, archeologists, etc., in the various countries. Among the concrete results arising from resolutions adopted by the meetings, we may cite the publication of the pamphlet on Holiday Courses in Europe, issued in March 1928 in English, French and German which is to become an annual. The National University Offices collaborate with the University Relations Bulletin, in sending in notices on the university life of their respective countries.

(2) In March 1928, after careful preparation and enquiries among the eventual participants, a meeting of experts for considering the means of coordinating the higher international studies was held in Berlin. Three international bodies, institutions of six European countries, and one American institution, were represented, and fall roughly into the following classification:-

Centres of study and discussion, Special and supplementary courses, teaching institutions outside the University proper, and University

#### Faculties.

The subjects discussed at the meeting, as affording possibilities of co-ordination, were:-

Programmes of studies, conditions of admission of members or students, exchange of visits of teachers or lecturers, co-operation in the supply of information, bibliography, publications and research.

The outstanding result of the Conference was the recognition that politics, in the broad sense of the term, constitutes a field for scientific study and that this field, which presents special characteristics of its own to the scientific worker, needs appropriate forms of organisation to aid him in his labours.

With regard to the possibilities of a future meeting, a Committee of five was appointed, to collaborate with the I.I.I.C. in preparing the ground for further discussion and in deciding what additional scientific institutions engaged in the study of politics should be invited to collaborate in the work.

(3) Two meetings of the representatives of International Students' Organisations having already been held in Geneva, the third annual meeting took place in Paris in April 1928, and was attended by 24 delegates of seven students' organisations and by representatives of various important international organisations, the latter being present in an advisory capacity. Each of the organisations submitted a report on its own work.

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The meeting then proceeded to a discussion of certain general questions, among the most important of which were unemployment among intellectual workers, the publication of an international University Handbook, the proposed international University Sanatorium, travelling facilities for students (including organised exchanges and the provision of an international identity card), and the prevention of overlapping in the dates of conferences in connection with the student world.

The organisations represented have each appointed a special delegate to the I.I.E.C., to ensure the maintenance of close relations between that body and the international students' organisations. These delegates will hold a meeting for the discussion of practical working points in November next.

We venture to think that the above-described activities of the I.I.E.C. serve a useful purpose in enabling important national and international bodies to collaborate with one another in a regular and practical manner.

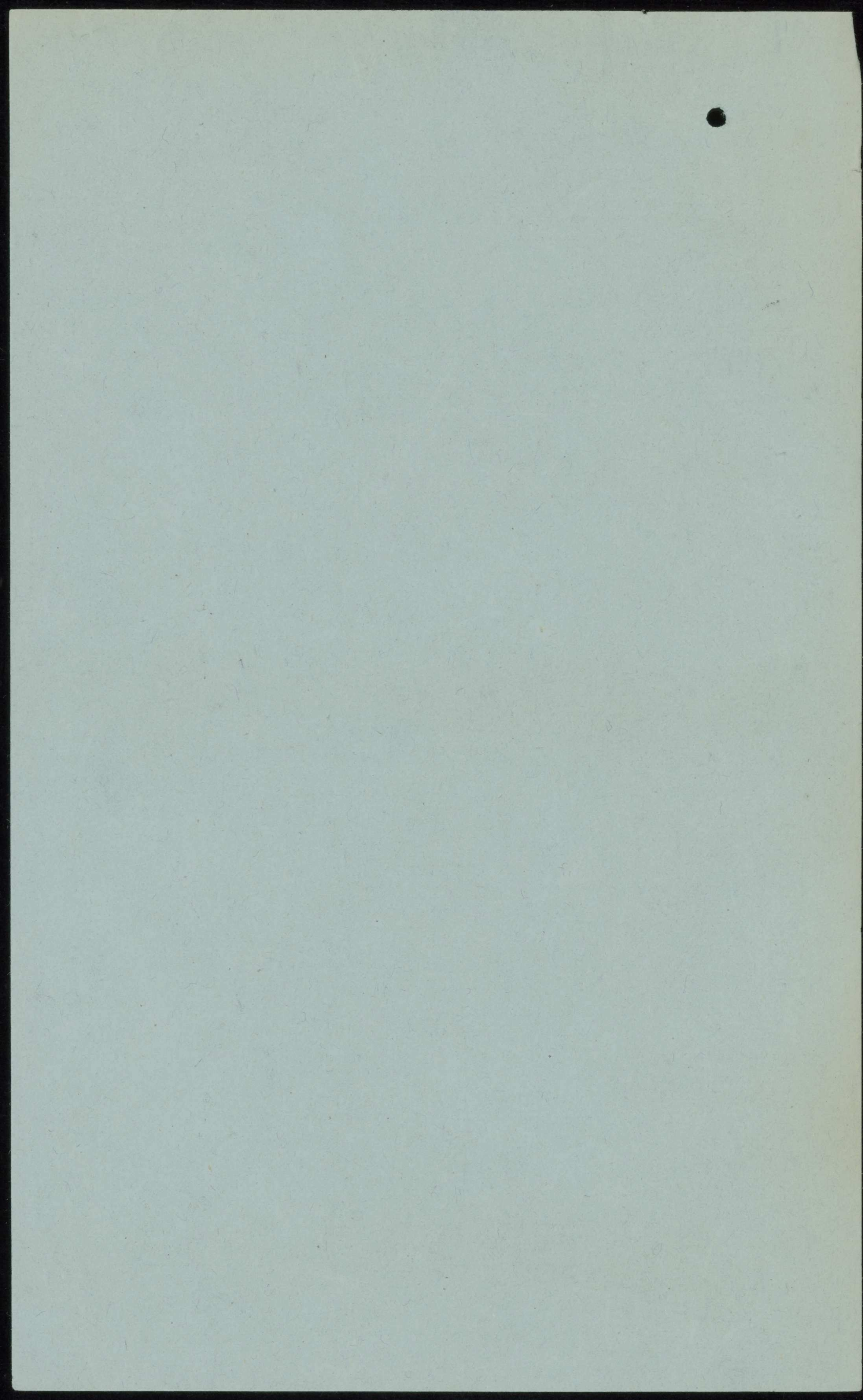

The International Institute of Statistics was founded in 1900, and its first meeting was held in 1901. The Institute has since that time been engaged in a continuous effort to promote the development of statistics as a science and as a practical tool for the advancement of human knowledge and welfare. The Institute's work is carried out through a series of international congresses, which are held every two years. These congresses provide a forum for the exchange of ideas and information among statisticians from all over the world. The Institute also publishes a series of journals and books, which are widely read and respected in the field of statistics. The Institute's work is supported by a number of governments and private organizations, and it has a long and distinguished history of service to the world.

- (1) The first meeting of the Institute was held in 1901, in London, and was attended by representatives from 12 countries.
- (2) The second meeting was held in 1903, in Rome, and was attended by representatives from 15 countries.
- (3) The third meeting was held in 1905, in Paris, and was attended by representatives from 18 countries.
- (4) The fourth meeting was held in 1907, in London, and was attended by representatives from 20 countries.
- (5) The fifth meeting was held in 1909, in Rome, and was attended by representatives from 22 countries.
- (6) The sixth meeting was held in 1911, in Paris, and was attended by representatives from 24 countries.
- (7) The seventh meeting was held in 1913, in London, and was attended by representatives from 26 countries.
- (8) The eighth meeting was held in 1915, in Rome, and was attended by representatives from 28 countries.
- (9) The ninth meeting was held in 1917, in Paris, and was attended by representatives from 30 countries.
- (10) The tenth meeting was held in 1919, in London, and was attended by representatives from 32 countries.

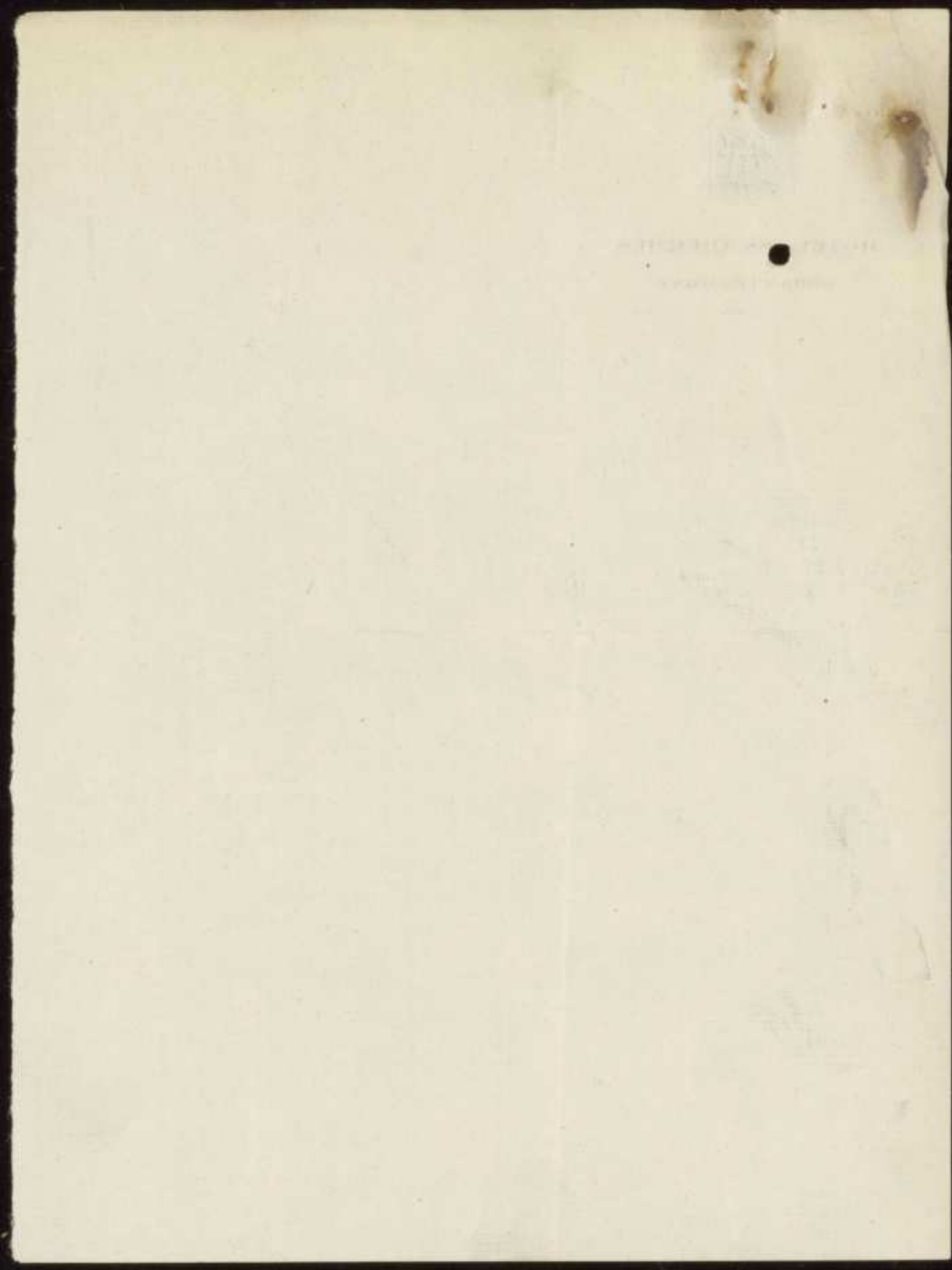



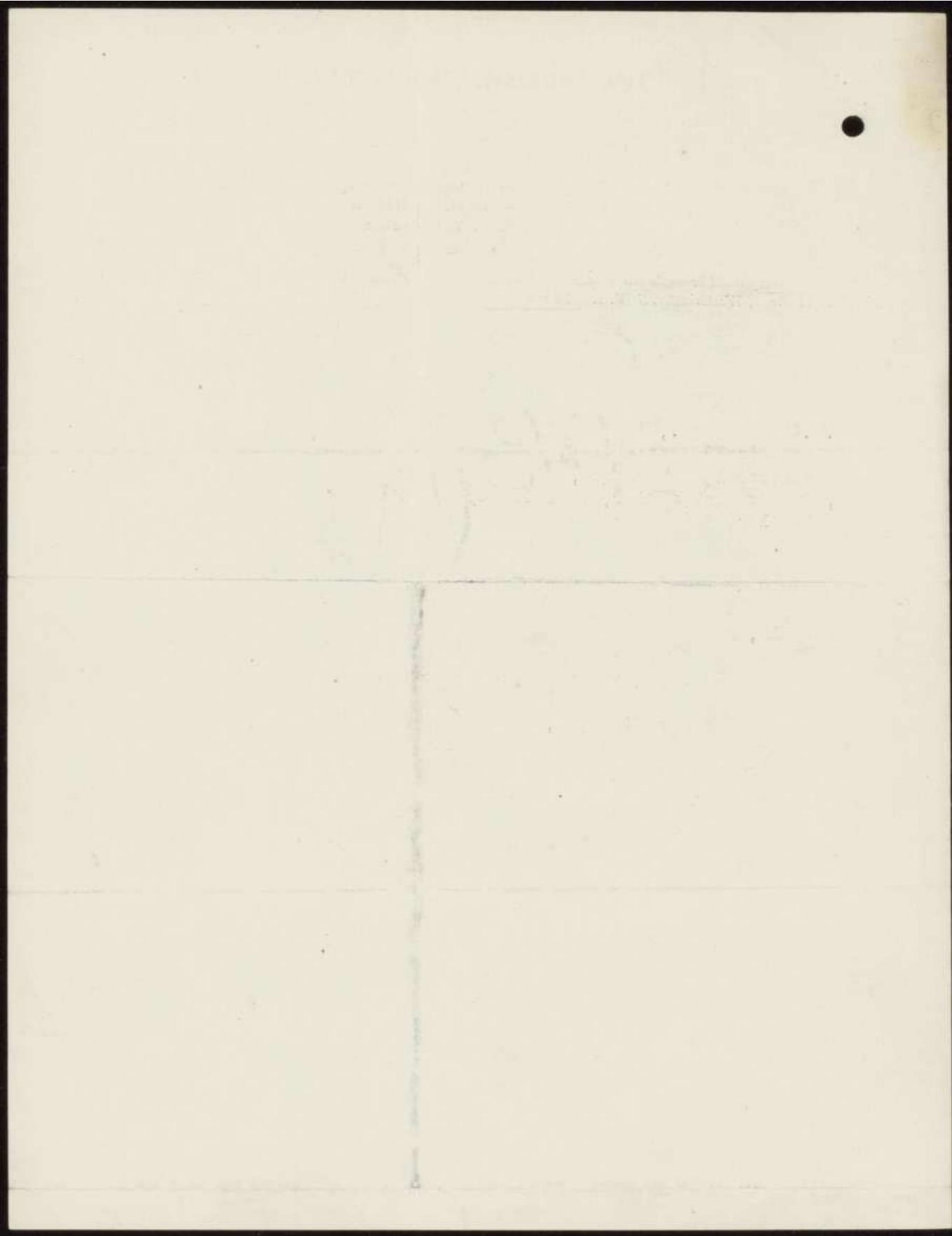
